
























ABOUT KSCH

Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage (KSCH) is a social enterprise functioning at the grass root level for the permanent developmental changes of rural, urban and tribal areas of India. We believe that livelihood is the most important component of any sustainable developmental model. If we can improve economic conditions in the rural and tribal areas, we can automatically address other social aspects like Education, Health and Sanitation. Hence, our immediate focus is on the development of existing livelihood including Agriculture, Horticulture, Fish Harvesting and Poultry that are prevalent in these rural and tribal areas. We provide technical assistance for the development of Education, Health, and Sanitation. We are also working towards providing a platform for traditional folk music, dance and artifacts as livelihood generating mechanisms for rural people. We encourage community led developmental programs to foster growth and awareness within the communities.

ESTABLISHING PAPER PLATE PRODUCTION UNIT IN THE SUNDERBANS



Rapid deterioration of ecology because of the pollution caused by Styrofoam and plastic items in the Sunderbans has been a matter of great concern. Since most of the people who live in the islands of the Sunderbans rely on the forests and the rivers for their livelihood, any harm caused to the ecology harms their livelihood too. To save nature and the people of the delta region Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage came up with the idea of installing paper plate making machines which would churn out eco-friendly paper plates and at the same time would become a source of income for the villagers. Sunderban Tiger Reserve (STR), one of the custodians of the delta forest chose Bally island as the place to establish the paper-plate production unit.

The machines were handed over to self-help group women who were then trained to operate them. Raw materials were also provided. In the beginning the daily production was 500 plates per day. But once the SHG women got accustomed to operate the machines more deftly the daily production touched 4500 plates per day. Boat owners, hotel owners, local shopkeepers started using the biodegradable paper plates in place of the non-biodegradable thermocol plates. Direct market linkage widened the profit margin and as a result the SHG women got to see a respectable growth in their monthly earnings. Above all the usage of hazardous items such as thermocol plates and plastic containers have come to naught in the region since the installation paper-plate making macines.







SUNDERBAN PAPER PLATE EXPORT


Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage had installed a paper plate production unit in Jharkhali in 2021 to reduce the use of Styrofoam plates or other bio-hazardous items such as plastic containers. The production unit has also been serving as an alternative source of income for 45 self-help group women. They sell the paper plates to hotel owners, retail sellers, boat operators and home stay owners. The effort of the village women got a huge moral boost when a Durga Puja organizer from the Netherlands showed interest to buy and use the paper plates to serve prasadam to the devotees. The export filled the SHG women with a renewed sense of self-belief and hope. They are now looking forward to getting more such oversees orders which would increase their earnings and decrease their dependence on the forest.





MANGROVE PLANTATION CONSULTATION WITH INDIAN NAVY

Indian Navy invited Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage to be a part of its celebration of 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav'. Indian Navy's Western Command has lined up myriads of activities to celebrate the 75th year of India's independence. Planting mangrove saplings along the Mumbai coastline topped the chart. A formal invitation was sent to KSCH to visit the western navy base Hamla and share the technical intricacies of planting mangrove saplings and growing a mangrove forest much like KSCH did in the Sunderbans. On the auspicious day KSCH visited the base and explained to our esteemed hosts how the plantation should be done and what were the risks and rewards of the same. The navy officials thanked KSCH for sharing such rare knowledge with them and promised to get back to us for future consultations too.





PAKHI-GHOR

'Pakhi-Ghor' which literally means bird's nest was a unique initiative which focused on providing birds spaces for living in buildings and man-made structures. Rapid urbanization has decimated the greenery in and around the city. As a result, our feathery friends are rendered homeless and they are forced to migrate to other places. Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage in collaboration with Merlin I am Kolkata and Dept. of Architecture, Jadavpur organized a day long workshop where sixty students of architecture from different colleges and universities of the city

participated and created nests for birds by using eco-friendly materials and solid waste. The students were divided in groups and each group was mentored by a professional architect. The idea was to create prototypes of bird-nest which could be incorporated in modern buildings without compromising the aesthetics. The enthusiasm amongst the participants was notable as they had never participated in an event so out of the box. Pakhi-Ghor showed that the concrete jungle meant for human beings could also serve as an aviary and cohabitation of different species in an urban set up is not a myth.





SOLAR STREET LIGHT INSTALLATION IN SUNDERBAN



More than 4500 villagers living in five villages situated in the Kultali Range of the Sunderbans breathed a sigh of relief as solar street lamps installed by Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage illuminated the frequented by both humans and tigers. Walking on the brick road after sunset used to be a nightmarish experience for the villagers because the road happens to be very close to the jungle and there were no street lights. Only a canal stood between the jungle and the road. Taking advantage of the darkness, tigers would easily cross the canal and target villagers and domestic animals at will. Snake bites were also a very common occurrence. The villagers were terrified to come out of their homes after sunset. Power supply in

these areas was either infrequent or nonexistent. Under such circumstances solar powered lamps were the only option. With funding from The Chatterjee Group (TCG) and logistical support from the Dept. of Forest (SBR) KSCH installed 25 solar street lamps on the kuchharoad that bordered the Chituri forest. According to forest officials the solar lights would act as a deterrent as tigers tend to avoid illuminated areas. The villagers now can walk on the same stretch without the fear of a tiger lurking in the dark. The solar lights are capable of generating 182.5 kilowatt of renewable electricity every year. The idea of installing solar street lights reduced mananimal conflict drastically in that area and at the same time helped the ecologically fragile Sunderbans by reducing carbon footprint.



REVIVAL OF SUNDERBAN PATACHITRA



'There was a time when the villagers of the Sunderbans would paint their day to day life or the local folklore on a long piece of cloth much like the scroll painting of Midnapore. Then they would describe the paintings through songs. This was how 'Bono Bibir Pala' was handed down from generations to generations. But with time the art went extinct. Bono Bibir Pala is still sung by a handful of people but the tradition of painting the same on a scroll is long gone. Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage felt the need to revive the lost art and decided to turn it into an alternative source of income for the villagers, especially women. Meanwhile, Sunderbans Tiger Reserve had been looking for new ideas to minimize the number of human-wild encounter within its urisdiction. KSCH and STR (Sunderban Tiger Reserve) joined hands and started training a group of women from villages located near the Sajnekhali Wildlife Sanctuary. Expert painters were brought from Kolkata to

train the beneficiaries. The training period lasted four months. Besides scrolls the village women were taught to paint on other items such as earthen pots and plates, tea pots, hand fans, book marks, lanterns and t-shirts. The idea was to sell these merchandise to the tourists as souvenirs. Perseverance and hard work of the beneficiaries did not go in vain and soon they learned the art form. An exhibition cum handicraft fair was held at the Mangrove Information Centre inside the Sajnekhali Range Office which is frequented by tourists in great numbers. The tourists were more than happy to see such beautifully painted merchandise and bought as mementoes. The beneficiaries too were excited as they sold their creations with their own hands. The success of the exhibition cum fair prompted the forest dept. to open permanent stalls at different locations. The beneficiaries now have a steady source of income and they do not want to go back to the jungle for honey or crab.



SIGNING OF MOU WITH WBCA

'On 24th March 2023 Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage signed an MOU with West Bengal Cyclists Association to use sports for all round development of boys and girls and to provide opportunities to develop career in sports and mobilise social entrepreneurship. The signing of the MOU took place at the Sports Journalists Club, SAI. Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage and West Bengal Cyclists Association were also handed over the responsibilities of conducting the All Women Cycling Championship involving 7 states under Govt. of India's Khelo India Khelo scheme by the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs, Govt. of India.





KHELO INDIA KHELO- WOMEN ROAD CYCLING CHAMPIONSHIP

The All Women Road Cycling Championship under Govt. of India's Khelo India Khelo initiative was organized by Sports Authority of India in association with West Bengal Cyclists Association and Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage on 26th March 2023. The event was sponsored by Shyam Steel India. Cyclists from 7 states took part in the championship. Tanu Bharti from UP bagged the gold medal in 15km Time Trial. Sital Chhetri from West Bengal bagged the gold medal in Elite Category (20km trial). Tara Minz from Jharkhand earned the gold medal in Sub Junior Girls' Time Trial. Eminent former footballer

Sri Mehtab Hussain and Sri Milan KantiMondol, DFO, South 24 Parganas were present during the prize giving ceremony along with other eminent dignitaries. Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage now wants to promote the sport at district level and find talents for national level from West Bengal. Those talented boys and girls will then be trained and groomed. They will also be provided with sponsorship. In this way KSCH wants to create a healthy and scientific mechanism to find talents and nurture them for the growth of sports and games in the country.





MANGROVE PLANTATION

The fortification of the mangrove forests in the Sunderbans is being prioritized by national and the international organizations working on environment due to its high vulnerability rate of being affected by the rise in sea-water level. mangrove forests have shielding the delta region from the ill effects of global warmingbut successive cyclones in the past few years have damaged the green armour to a great extent. Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage has been working with the forest dept. and other private entities such as WEBEL, NKR Trust, SISK to reinforce the mangrove forests for the past few years. So far we have planted more than 600000 saplings. The saplings are grown by the villagers in their own nurseries and they plant the saplings themselves. They are also given the responsibility to take care of the saplings post plantation. In this way a sustainable model has been established through capacity building that has created an alternative source of income for the villagers.In this war against climate change KSCH promises to be at the frontline and take the challenge head on.

42ND WEST BENGAL STATE CYCLING CHAMPIONSHIP



The 42nd West Bengal State Cycling Championship was held on 28th and 29th of February in New town under the supervision of Cycling Federation of India. Kolkata Society for Cultural Heritage and West Bengal Cyclists Association were in charge of conducting the grand event. Over 310 cycling enthusiasts from across the state got themselves registered for the event. To make the event more inclusive A separate segment was created for the girls who had got cycles under the state governments 'ShobujSathi' scheme. The goal of the event was to promote cycling, the eco-friendliest means of transport. The event was not only a mere competition but also an awareness program to educate people about the

benefits of cycling. Air pollution levels in the cities are touching new heights every year due to the unprecedented growth in numbers of motorized vehicles which are run on fossil fuel. The common citizens have to bear the brunt of this environmental disaster. More and more people should be encouraged to use bicycles as the mode of last mile connectivity and reduce their dependence on motorized vehicles. It is good for our health too.
